species remind me of our Tu B'shvat seder back on January 29, a short half-year ago. Tu B'shvat is one "New Year" in the Jewish calendar; soon we will have another. Then and now we thank God for the earth's rich bounties—then through sacrifice, now through blessings.

Passover is referenced in this week's reading. In Deuteronomy 26:5, we find the well-known Biblical quotation heard at the Passover seder: "My father was a wandering Aramean. He went down to Egypt with meager numbers and sojourned there, but there he became a great and very populous nation." Though we are in Deuteronomy, we are never far from Exodus. Our exodus from Egypt is oftreferenced within the Bible (it has its very own book, of course). Ki Tavo references Israel's exodus from Egypt; however, it also contains an extraordinary litany of curses that could beset the Jewish people if they do not heed God's laws. Fortunately, the length and detail of God's threatened retributions are resident in this parashah alone. It is quite sobering.

That said, we know what to do and what not to do—think Ten Commandments. We learn that although God may be tough (an understatement), abundant kindness and mercy can ameliorate severe punishment. I believe that Rachelle Valladerez finds a similar hopeful conclusion in her d'var Torah (sermon) she is sharing with us Friday. Perhaps not. I can't wait to find out.

Ki Tavo begins with allusions to Tu B'shvat, continues with Passover references, and concludes with the hope of a full life for those who follow God's ways, our prayer for the Yom Kippur season.

The in-person Shabbat Under the Stars last Friday was greatly enjoyed by all who attended. It was a beautiful setting with a colorful sunset and near full moon. Thanks to the Langs for reserving the Bel Air Pavilion, the setup, and for providing various treats. Friday services are at 7:30 pm at B'er Chayim Temple and on Zoom.

## This Week's Torah Portion

#### Ki Tavo

כִּי-תַבוֹא

When You Enter [the Land]

Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

## Summary

- The Israelites are instructed to express their gratitude to God for their bountiful harvests and freedom from slavery by tithing ten percent of their crops for the Levite, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow. (26)
- The people are told to display on large stones God's commandments for all to see. (27:1-8)
- The Levites are to proclaim curses upon those who violate God's commandments. (27:15-26)
- The Israelites are told that if they obey God's mitzvot faithfully, they will receive every blessing imaginable. They are also told that if do not fulfill their brit with God, many curses will descend upon them. (28:1-69)
- Moses reminds the Israelites of the miracles they witnessed in the wilderness and commands them to observe the terms of the covenant so
