This Friday, December 31, there is no Shabbat evening service; however, the next day is the first Saturday of the month—when our regularly-scheduled Shabbat morning service (10:00 am) takes place. would want to miss. Blood is one thing, but fire-breathing ice is quite extraordinary (Exodus IX:24), well-predating George Lucas and CGI. Unfortunately, plagues are not limited to Biblical times.

The Cumberland Area Interfaith Ministerial Association met last week on Zoom. Its multidenominational members encourage everyone to be fully vaccinated notwithstanding medical exceptions—and cautious. We are able to make better choices than Pharaoh did for his people.

Adult Hebrew recently discovered that much of the liturgy associated with prayer is comprised of direct quotations from the Torah and Psalms. The siddur is carefully constructed, dense in meaning. We saw an example of this in the first part of the Torah service (Mishkan T'filah, p. 244). Lines 5-6 may consist of only eight words, but they are sourced from three different texts (Psalm 10:16; Psalm 96:10; and Exodus 15:18). Similarly, Mishkan T'filah provides sources to many other prayers at the bottom of its pages. Sermons can be dull; the siddur should not be so. During the next uninspired d'var, I encourage you to look at some of these notes.

Adult Education's "Aseret: The Big Ten" begins next week. Materials have been ordered, but it's not too late to get a set of your own, in digital or print form. Just visit their website.

Va-eira

וָאַרָא

I (God) Appeared [to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob]

Exodus 6:2–9:35

Summary

- Despite God's message that they will be redeemed from slavery, the Israelites' spirits remain crushed. God instructs Moses and Aaron to deliver the Israelites from the land of Egypt. (6:2-13)
- The genealogy of Reuben, Simeon, Levi, and their descendants is recorded. (6:14-25)
- Moses and Aaron perform a miracle with a snake and relate to Pharaoh God's message to let the Israelites leave Egypt. (7:8-13)
- The first seven plagues occur. God hardens Pharaoh's heart, and Pharaoh rescinds each offer to let the Israelites go. (7:14-9:35)
